

The 1997-98 Alberta Schoolreach year was again a tremendous success. A number of previously intramural schools were placed in leagues forming a total of eight regional leagues with three intramural locations remaining. All indications show we will have additional schools joining next year meaning even more regional leagues. We have an estimated 180-200 teams playing in these leagues. Many of our schools have adopted the junior league so they often run a minimum of six teams from each school. The fact that Alberta hosts a provincial competition for intermediates accounts for the tremendous number of players at the junior level.

Each regional league and intramural school was represented at Provincial's which were held in Plamondon, Alberta. This is the second year that Bernard Germaine, staff and community have hosted provincials and it was nothing short of awesome! They were the perfect hosts to 12 senior teams and 14 intermediate teams. The competition was run over one day and it was most entertaining for those who had the opportunity to sit in on games. # MANITOBA REPORT



Manitoba saw an increase in teams in both senior and intermediate leagues. The Senior division increased from 19 to 26 teams while the Intermediate division increased from 7 to 11 teams.

Fifty five players and twenty-two coaches, parents and SCHOOLREACH staff gathered at Shirreff Hall for 3 days of competition, sight-seeing and cross-Canada cultural exchange. Friday saw the arrival of the ten competing teams who were greeted with a 'plethora of paraphernalia'. After a brief introductory meeting, players and coaches settled in for a deserved night's rest.

On Saturday, teams gathered in the Dalhousie Arts and Administration Building for introductory remarks and an outline of the procedure for the Preliminary Tournament. A corps of dedicated volunteers took care of scoring and reporting results from five rooms. A group of local Reach alumni acted as quizmasters and did an excellent job of handling the 45 hotly contested games. Five rounds were completed in the morning session and play adjourned for lunch, a campus tour and free-time to enjoy the hot and sunny Halifax afternoon. The highlights of the New Brunswick Reach For The Top 1997-98 season were the five weekend contests, culminating in the Championship Tournament at Oromocto High School on May 2.

Southern Victoria High won the first three competitions at James M. Hill High, St. Andrews, and at their own tournament. Mirmichi Valley High, a first-year Reach school, hosted eight teams in March, and last year's champion, James M. Hill, received the winner's trophy.

There were seventeen teams at the Oromocto tournament, nine in the Championship draw. Both Southern Victoria and Fredericton High went through the preliminaries and sime-finals undefeated. Southern Vic defeated James M. Hill 400 to 370 in the semi-final and Fredericton bested Miramichi Valley 380-280 in the other. In the spirited final Championship game, Fredericton High outscored Southern Victoria 520 to 440.

Windermere Secondary in Vancouver was a welcome addition to that league. In addition, Shawnigan Lake School on Vancouver Island joined and it's hoped that other schools in the area will follow suit next year.

Inter-school games were held in both leagues for the fall and winter terms, with the Intermediate Tournament winners coming from St. George's School.
