

Fredericton High School was a repeat champion at the New Brunswick Reach For The Top final competition held at Oromocto High School on Saturday, May 1. F.H.S. defeated upstart Hampton High 435 to 420 in a close, exciting final.

In semifinal action, Fredericton bested James M. Hill 485 to 150 and Hampton got by Southern Victoria 345 –260. Other teams in the competition were Minto, Nackawic, Sir James Dunn, St. Stephen, Bathurst, Miramichi Valley, and Oromocto. Fredericton High also won the non-championship side of the tournament with the # 2 team.

Most of **Fredericton High**'s 1998 championship team were grade 11 students, so they had a second run at the Nationals. Team members for 1999 are **Krista Byers-Heinlein**, **Alex Frank**, **Ben Goodyear**, **Rob Langmaid**, **Janssen Kirby**, **and Martin Tingley**. **Cynthia Urquhart** was serving her final year as F.H.S. coach/advisor as she will be moving to the new Fredericton North Leo Hayes High as vice-principal in the fall.





Pinawa teens reach for top, take third against Goliaths

As atomic energy research is slowly phased out of Finawa's economy, a group of talented students has stepped forward to give the town a new reputation. The community is now home to the little school that could.

Four Pinawa teens returned home yesterday to a learn's retioner after achieving the unthinkable—placing third in a national Reach For the Top competition that the achool has been to in three of the past four years.

While this alone may not seem too incredible for a school in a town of nuclear scientists, consider this: Pinava Secondary School's entire student body stands at about 170. With other scademic turnes crealing from huge schools in cities such as Edmonton, Out, and Kingston, Out, thereof Miller said it felt good for the team to play David against the other schools' Goliarby.

"It's really exciting," said Millor, 18, after flying back to Wannipeg from Toronto with his coach and three learnmates. He said beating the first-place finisher—a school from Kingston—twice during the transament, made the achievement even soore

special.

"We figure that puts us into the top one per cent of all schools in the country that's significant."

The four teammates — three Grade 12 students and one in Grade 16 — went busier to buzzer against nine other teams at the University of Taronto in a three-day beainfest that started Saturday.

Reach For the Top competitions pit atsdent academics against one another in a race to score points by quickly asswering a moderator's questions pertaining to science, licenstore, mathematics, sports and popular culture, among other things.

Robin Attas, 18, said her experience in music mixed in nicely with the knowledge of the others on her small-town team.

"And we don't fight as a team," she said.
"If one of us makes a mistake, we just say 'that's OK,' and we stay focused."

Research and hard work got the group to its third-place fittisk, said 17-year-old Joey Baumpartner, adding the team practised by looking over old television scripts from Reach For the Top and by keeping in mind the weaknesses of other topons they had neet before.

But for Bobin's brother Jesse Attas, the 15-year-old junior of the squad, success in the game-comes more from general knowledge than texthooks.

"I read the newspapers a lot and watch whatever is happening around the world," he said.

Lindsay Thurber Comprehensive High School has lived up to its reputation as a hotbsed of scholastic talent. Both the senior and intermediate teams captured gold medals at the provincial SchoolReach finals in Drumheller on the weekend.

The senior squad, which has played together for four years, has now won two golds and a silver in the past three precin-

And the school has landed a whopping eight medals since 1995, said Barry Litun, SchoolReoch coach and high school-vice
